## What is upcoming in the Maths Department?

## AMSP 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> December

The Advanced Mathematics Support Programme is a government-funded initiative. It aims to increase participation in Core Maths, AS/A level Mathematics and Further Mathematics, and improve the teaching of these level 3 maths qualifications.

The programme provides national support for teachers and students in state-funded schools and colleges in England. Additional support is offered in areas of low social mobility so that, whatever their gender, background or location, students can choose their best post-16 maths pathway and have access to high quality teaching.

## 'Employability skills within the curriculum' project

Maths have had the opportunity to work to create an Employability Skills Programme that aims to ***'Construct connections between classroom learning and careers'***. We are excited to embark on this project, alongside Mrs Kerr, to create some lessons to share across the city.



## English Update

### **'Read More Be More Bot'**

Thank you to Higher Horizons for funding our new book vending machine here in the library at St Thomas More Catholic Academy. This is an amazing incentive for pupils in year 7&8 who will be rewarded for improvements shown in their Bedrock Vocabulary. ### **Higher Horizons: White Water Writers Project**


'You can make anything by writing' C S Lewis.

A group of Year 9 students have participated in the White Water Writers project, which provided the opportunity for them to collaboratively write and publish a full length novel in just one week of intensive teamwork and creative writing activity.

At a later date, the school will be hosting a book signing event, which will be attended by the friends and families of our published authors, celebrating this incredible achievement. Research conducted by King's College London and Keele University, evidences that the project has a demonstrable positive impact on writers' self esteem, feelings of control and the development of interpersonal skills. This is in addition to helping students to become better and more motivated writers.

### **English Language Examiner Masterclasses**

A group of Year 11 students have had the fantastic opportunity to work closely with Caroline Davis (Senior AQA Examiner for GCSE English Language and Literature), in a sequence of Masterclasses. In addition to her work with the exam board, Caroline has also co-written a series of workbooks, utilising her examiner expertise. The sessions were specifically designed to support students in their preparation for the mock examinations. Caroline, who works with schools across the country, applauded our pupils' dedication to their studies and their mature approach towards learning.



### **Treasure Island: English Excellence Project**



As part of the English Excellence Project, Stoke on Trent schools have joined the initiative to improve transition for Year 7 pupils across the city. This has been extremely successful and the students are thoroughly enjoying the scheme of work and exploring this classic adventure novel.

At the start of the school year, several members of staff at St Thomas More Catholic Academy were filmed whilst teaching their Treasure Island lessons. This was to further ensure the smooth transition and to share good practice across other Stoke on Trent schools. The students were amazing during the filming, showing fantastic progress and knowledge of the text, but also representing our school values of Faith, Excellence and Respect.

The girls have been back in action in the city netball competitions, with many of our students attending the after school netball clubs ran by Mrs Staton, Miss Matthews and Miss Sproston.




### Athletics

## Wellbeing

It has been a busy term with lots of wellbeing interventions across the school which have been very well received by students, with excellent feedback from students and visitors alike.

Our year 7 students have transitioned well with some additional support in place for students via our pastoral team with Miss Warren and Mrs Britton. Additional intervention groups have included our Year 7 AIM provision where students have done PSHE, emotional literacy and extra transition activities, all of which have received excellent feedback from the students who have participated so far. We have also been fortunate to be able to offer drawing and talking emotional literacy interventions delivered by our Education Mental Health Practitioner. Students have engaged extremely well and it is wonderful to hear what a credit the students have been to the school.

A group of year 8 students were selected to take part in the Diamond Families building resilience and self-empowerment session. Students got to meet Scruffy the dog and George the rabbit. The two sessions were brilliant and delivered in a way that the students forgot that they were in an intervention session and learning, yet learnt so much! It was a delight to watch the young people engage and their feedback has been brilliant including 10/10 from most students and a billion out of 10 from the one! Students reported, 'the best lessons in my life', 'taking the message of kindness, resilience and remembering that when you need help to talk' and 'I gained confidence that I will take into my school and home life.'



We have recently teamed up with Changes and are offering small group interventions around: Anger Management; Managing Worry; Understanding Sadness; Helpful vs Unhelpful Thinking; Positive Self-image and Healthy Relationships. Initial feedback from students and staff supporting in the sessions has been fantastic and we look forward to being able to offer more sessions in the New Year.

Year 11 students are about to partake in an Exam Stress Workshop with North Staffs Mind. This workshop is interactive and led by the students. It will include:-

- ⇒ Identifying causes of exam stress
- ⇒ Myths and facts about exam stress
- ⇒ Practical exam hints and tips
- ⇒ Recognising different strategies/techniques work for different people
- ⇒ The importance of time off/and time out from revision
- ⇒ Useful distraction techniques
- ⇒ Where to access additional support

## Wellbeing

It has been a challenging time for all students, especially for our GCSE students, so we have welcomed all additional support that we can offer our students.

As a school we work with a number of external agencies to ensure we are able to meet the mental health and wellbeing needs of all of our students.

The school nurse is in school every blue week Thursday lunch time. The school nurse team are introducing Virtual Chat Clinics for Young People starting from Monday 29th November 2021. The virtual clinics will run every Monday afternoon 3-4.30pm and students/school staff can book an appointment to have a telephone consultation. They will be using an app "One Consultation" which allows the health team to video call the student safely and securely. Appointments will need to be made via our School Nursing Hub Tel 0300 404 2993, students or school staff can make these appointments. Students can also text our CHAT health Service on 07520615723 to book a telephone appointment. Practitioners will then send the student a link via text message on the day of their appointment and call the student to discuss their worries.

## Careers



Quality Careers Provision continues to develop and have positive impacts on our students, giving real focus to their aspirations as they are supported in planning their career pathways.

Before term even started in August, the NCS Summer programme saw year 11 Students take part in a three- week summer programme, developing work ready skills, creating blogs, experiencing outdoor activities and undertaking a community project of their own design to help the local community.

Returning to school we saw the launch of our new Careers Platform Unifrog in Careers Assemblies for all year groups: every student was sent an email with details to access the Unifrog Careers Platform. This ensures that all students have access to personalised Careers information and guidance at all times and can work towards being independent researchers and applicants for jobs apprenticeships, universities college courses, BTECs, taking ownership of planning their career pathways.

Careers discussions at the face to face parents evenings ensured that Careers guidance was available all evening for year 11 and year 7 students and parents. This was followed a week later by a TEAMS employability session for parents and students, delivering Careers information, Post-16 options and careers planning support.

Our World of Work Week took place on 18<sup>th</sup> October – 22<sup>nd</sup> October: CPO Chris Smith of the Royal Navy gave a Careers talk to Year 9, Year 8 explored NHS jobs during their Careers competition launch, and Year 11 were given vital post-16 options information during a special assembly prior to their visit from a team of qualified independent careers advisors providing 1-1 appointments for year 11 students.

The BBC Bitesize Careers Innovations Live Tour came into school for all of Year 7,8,9 and 10 and all received an employer encounter with a film producer, film director, welder and Newsround presenter. The students heard all these creative employees of the BBC interviewed and then had the opportunity to ask questions. We had a great day broadening our career aspirations and expectations.



## Career Ready

Career Ready Graduation Ceremony was an enjoyable evening welcoming year 13 students and their families and mentors from local businesses to celebrate the culmination of 18 months of 1-1 mentoring, internship and masterclasses. The Career Ready programme builds employability skills and gives students real work experience and a mentor from a local business designed to help them to explore and prepare for the World of Work. Gary Curzon, Keith Nicholls from KMF Engineering, Caroline Emery from Career Ready and Ms Kerr all spoke to Congratulate the students on a fabulous achievement in an unprecedented time.

Career Ready Interviews for year 12 applicants took place at the end of November, with local employers from Stoke Council, KMF Engineering, Business Process Improvement Managers, Accountants and year 13 Career ready graduates. This was great interview experience for year 12 and 13s, and we had an amazing 20 successful applicants to move on to the next cohort of STMCA Career Ready Students.



## Stanley Head—Music Retreat

A group of 29 students attended Stanley Head outdoor centre on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> November and Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> November. The weather was beautiful enough for a lovely long walk in the countryside with lots of mud and stiles and cows!

The pupils spent their time practising lots of songs and carols in preparation for the Christmas Concert. There was time to play clarinets and recorders, and some of the students played drama games and worked on some dramatic pieces for the concert. Food was lots of pizza and muffins. A thoroughly enjoyable event for all.



## Sixth Form

### **Higher Horizons:**

All students in Year 12 attended a session delivered by Higher Horizons about accessing Higher Education and the benefits that this has. The session was delivered as a stage performance intertwining life experience alongside comedy. The students that attended found the session to be incredibly inspiring and thought provoking as it not only reinforced previous information but also showcased to students the opportunities that are available to them.

The Higher Horizons session was further supported by an open day to Staffordshire University whereby students participated in group sessions, small seminar discussions and a tour of the campus.
